1 Introduction

Whetū Consultancy Group (“Whetū”) has been engaged by WM New Zealand (“WMNZ”) to prepare a Cultural Values Assessment report (“CVA report”) to identify and understand the values of Mana Whenua in Tāmaki Makaurau in relation to WMNZ's proposal obtain new resource consents to enable the on-going placement of waste at Redvale Landfill up until 2036. Redvale Landfill is currently scheduled to cease accepting waste in December 2028 and due to a delay in the authorisation and establishment of the replacement Auckland Regional Landfill (“ARL”) a transition plan is required (“ARL Transition Project” and “ARL-TP”). The proposal is to continue sending the current residual waste (around 600,000 tonnes per year) to Redvale Landfill, beyond the existing consent limit of December 2028. This would require new resource consents at Redvale Landfill.

The purpose of this preliminary CVA report is not to identify the adverse (nor positive) impacts that will/may arise from the proposed fast-track activity. However, the report does offer recommendations for consideration by WMNZ to respond to the values of Mana Whenua and to inform further engagement and any subsequent substantive application (if the referral application is accepted). A record of consultation and engagement undertaken (as of the date of this report) is included as Appendix A.

This preliminary CVA report provides an outline of the initial findings and has been prepared for inclusion in an application for Ministerial referral of the project under the Fast-track Approvals Act 2024 (FTAA). Specifically, this memorandum responds to the requirements under section 3.4 of the Fast-track Approvals Referral Application Form. A full description of the draft proposal is included in the accompanying information attached to the application form for the referral.

2 Assessment methodology

Two separate workstreams have come together to prepare the CVA report. Both workstreams inform the assessment methodology.

The workstreams are:

1. Consultation and Engagement
2. Reporting Cultural/Mana Whenua Values Assessment

Workstream 1 – Consultation and Engagement

This workstream leads the consultation and engagement between WMNZ and Mana Whenua. A record of consultation and engagement is included as Appendix A.

The following principles inform and direct engagement for the proposed project:

- Principle #1 - Mana ki te Mana / Rangatira ki te Rangatira

- Principle #2 - Tikanga-Led Approach
- Principle #3 - Best Endeavours to Uphold Consultation Principles
- Principle #4 - Good Neighbour

The principles intend to recognise the High Court decision for the *Ngāti Maru Trust v Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei Whaia Maia Limited* [2020] NZHC 2768, specifically the matter about ‘primacy’ and whether or not one (1) mana whenua group can assert a greater customary authority in land or resource over another, and that a relevant strength claim must be clearly particularised and supported by evidence. Although it is about processes and decisions with the RMA, it is viewed that it has wider relevance across any resource management legislation, including the FTAA.

The Court summarised its findings as follows:

... when addressing the s 6(e) RMA requirement to recognise and provide for the relationship of Maori and their culture and traditions with their ancestral lands, water, sites, waahi tapu and other taonga, a consent authority, including the Environment Court, does have jurisdiction to determine the relative strengths of the hapu/iwi relationships in an area affected by a proposal, where relevant to claimed cultural effects of the application and wording of the resource consent conditions. But any assessment of this kind will be predicated on the asserted relationship being clearly grounded in and defined in accordance with tikanga Maori and matauranga Maori and that any claim based on it is equally clearly directed to the discharge of the statutory obligations to Maori and to a precise resource management outcome.¹

The High Court decision emphasised the relevance and importance of looking at cultural effects from an RMA perspective as identified through a tikanga process.

....the obligation “to recognise and provide for” the relationship of Māori and their culture and traditions with their whenua and other taonga must necessarily involve seeking input from affected iwi about how their relationship, as defined by them in tikanga Māori, is affected by a resource management decision².

On kaitiakitanga in the RMA:

[69] It is not possible to be definitive about the scope of the jurisdiction to respond to iwi tikanga-based claims, including claims based on asserted mana whenua, in the abstract. But the operation of s 7(a) dealing with kaitiakitanga is illustrative. Kaitiakitanga is exercised by the hapū or iwi that holds mana whenua over a particular area. As the RMA anticipates, and as this case exemplifies, there will be occasions when there are overlapping iwi interests in the same whenua. Nevertheless, s 7(a) directs that regard must be had to their respective kaitiakitanga. Where the views of those iwi diverge as to the responsibilities of kaitiaki, a decision may need to be made as to which of those views is to apply in the context of that particular application and that may involve evidential findings as to what the iwi consider is required in tikanga Māori.³

Whetū acknowledges WMNZ is committed to upholding the principle of kaitiakitanga by working in partnership with tangata whenua to manage waste responsibly, respect Papatūānuku, and support a sustainable future for generations to come.

Principle #1 - Mana ki te Mana / Rangatira ki te Rangatira

This principle recognises, and accommodates, the conduct in WMNZ’s consultation and engagement with Mana Whenua that people of equivalent mana/authority and decision-making are present and leading the discussion.

To uphold this principle, consultation and engagement with Mana Whenua by WMNZ is being led by WMNZ's Managing Director Evan Maehl, with Mr Maehl present in those discussions.

Principle #2 - Tikanga-Led Approach

A tikanga-led approach ensures Mana Whenua are placed at the centre of WMNZ's consultation and engagement with Mana Whenua, this includes WMNZ being consistent with any guidance and/or direction outlined in relevant iwi environmental management plans ("IEMP").

To support WMNZ's Managing Director Evan Maehl with the delivery of this principle is an independent advisor with expertise and mana to deliver a tikanga-led approach in WMNZ's consultation and engagement with Mana Whenua. Mr Terrence 'Mook' Hohneck is the advisor to Mr Maehl on the project.

Principle #3 - Best Endeavours to Uphold Consultation Principles

The following principles are derived from case law which have defined good consultation in RMA processes:

- Early (consult as soon as possible, when proposal is less 'set in concrete')
- Transparent (open about what you want to achieve)
- Open mind (keep personal views open to other people's responses)
- Two-way process (reciprocal exchange of information, - listen and consider other perspectives)
- Ongoing (communication continuing after lodgement of application, or even after a decision has been made)
- Agreement not necessary (consultation does not mean that all parties have to agree, although it is expected that a genuine effort is made)

WMNZ has endeavoured to uphold these consultation principles in its consultation and engagement with Mana Whenua to date and will continue to do so in its ongoing engagement.

Principle #4 - Good Neighbour

In its first interim Environment Court decision *Port of Tauranga Limited v Bay of Plenty Regional Council* [2023] NZEnvC 270, the Court referred to the concept "good neighbour" regarding the efforts required of the Port of Tauranga Ltd ("POTL") to consult and respond to tangata whenua, and cites the *Te Rūnanga o Ngāi Te Rangi Trust v Bay of Plenty Regional Council* [2011] NZEnvC 402 decision in regards to the "good neighbour" concept.

Additionally, the POTL Environment Court decision outlines the applicability of the consultation principles (identified above), and the nature of developers/resource users to be a good neighbour to those affected.

WMNZ has consulted and engaged (and will to continue to) in a manner that input from Mana Whenua in the proposed Redvale Landfill fast-track project is necessary to identify and appropriately manage any adverse effect on Mana Whenua values.

Workstream 2 – Reporting Cultural/Mana Whenua Values Assessment

This workstream supports Workstream 1 by preparing the report that documents WMNZ's consultation and engagement with Mana Whenua, alongside the review and consideration of available iwi documentation, to identify the cultural and environmental values and interests of Mana Whenua in Tāmaki Makaurau, as well as their spiritual, historical, and traditional associations to the Redvale Landfill Project area/catchment.

The report methodology is a literature review of available relevant documentation, these are:

- Treaty settlement legislation and Deeds of Settlement within Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland
- Relevant Mana Whenua provisions in the Auckland Unitary Plan
- IEMPs, and
- Technical reports prepared to support the WMNZ’s substantive application.

The framework for the CVA report identifies relevant provisions within IEMPs, as well as identifying relevant Mana Whenua provisions in the Auckland Unitary Plan that are applicable to the proposed Redvale Landfill project.

Information recorded from engagement sessions with Mana Whenua as part of Workstream 1 clarifies and synthesizes the cultural values.

3 Mana Whenua within the Redvale Landfill Project Area

WMNZ sought guidance from the Auckland Council website⁴ which identified that 19 iwi authorities are recognised by the Auckland Council as representing the interest of Mana Whenua in Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland

Treaty settlement legislation and signed Deeds of Settlement were reviewed to clarify the extent of the area of interests of each of Mana Whenua. In total, there are 10 treaty settlement legislation and two signed Deeds of Settlements. Of these 12 Mana Whenua, it is considered that eight (8) Mana Whenua have interest within the Redvale Landfill Project Area, they are:

1. Ngāti Manuhiri (represented by the Ngāti Manuhiri Settlement Trust)
2. Ngāti Whātua Ōrakei (represented by the Ngāti Whātua o Ōrakei Trust Board)
3. Ngāti Whātua o Kaipara (represented by Ngā Maunga Whakahii o Kaipara Development Trust)
4. Te Kawerau ā Maki (represented by the Te Kawerau Iwi Settlement Trust)
5. Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki (represented by the Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki Trust)
6. Ngāti Tamaoho (represented by the Ngāti Tamaoho Settlement Trust)
7. Ngāti Pāoa (represented by the Ngāti Pāoa Iwi Trust)
8. Te Ākitai Waiohua (represented by the Te Ākitai Waiohua Settlement Trust)

There are a few Mana Whenua with Deeds of Settlement that are initialled but not signed, as well as a number of Mana Whenua that have not achieved their Deed of Settlement yet.

After reviewing their documentation, it is considered that the following Mana Whenua are also applicable to the proposed Redvale Landfill project area:

9. Ngāti Whātua (represented by Te Rūnanga o Ngāti Whātua)
10. Ngaati Whanaunga (represented by the Ngaati Whanaunga Incorporated Society)
11. Ngāti Tamaterā (represented by the Ngāti Tamaterā Treaty Settlement Trust)
12. Ngāti Maru (represented by the Ngāti Maru Rūnanga Trust)

Of the known and available IEMPs in the Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland area applicable to the proposed Redvale Landfill project area are:

- Te Kawerau ā Maki – Resource Management Statement 1995
- Hauraki Māori Trust Board – Whaia Te Mahere Taiao a Hauraki: Hauraki Iwi Environmental Management Plan 2004

- Ngāti Whātua Ōrākei – Te Pou o Kahu Pōkere Iwi Management Plan 2018
- Ngaati Whanaunga – Environmental Management Plan 2019
- Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki – Take Taiaomaurikura 2022

4 Relevant Cultural/Mana Whenua Values

From the information available, the following values have been identified below.

Cultural Value	Explanation
1. Rangatiratanga / Mana	Rangatiratanga / Mana is a shared value across Mana Whenua. This is reflected in a number of ways: • Recognising the customary authority and role of Mana Whenua in resource management • Mana Whenua taking leadership role to restoring the mauri of te taiao • The importance of ahi kā and whakapapa/connection to place
2. Kaitiakitanga	Kaitiakitanga is a shared value and there is general consistency across Mana Whenua that kaitiakitanga is guardianship and the pursuit of conservation and/or protection. It also involves: • Active involvement (varies between Mana Whenua) • Exercising in accordance with tikanga of Mana Whenua • Implementing tikanga (e.g. rāhui) and application of mātauranga • Applying a holistic view to resource management • Activities and approaches that address cumulative effects
3. Protection of Waahi Tapu & Cultural Heritage Sites	This shared cultural value seeks to avoid adverse impacts on waahi tapu (includes sites and areas of significance and importance to Mana Whenua) and identified cultural heritage sites.
4. Restoration and Protection of Waterways	A shared concern is the degradation of waterways, with Mana Whenua recognising that improving water quality is a major challenge. Restoring the mauri of waterways is a shared value between Mana Whenua, with suggested approaches such as co-ordinated efforts and the practice of sustainable development emphasised. Protection is viewed as the avoidance of further degradation of waterways, as well as protecting the efforts where restoration has occurred.
5. Enhance and Protect Native Flora and Fauna (Terrestrial Ecology)	A shared concern is the loss and/or decline of native flora and fauna. A common goal is to enhance native biodiversity and its resilience.

6. Certainty	Understanding and managing the risks to the environment, and to people/communities, arising from landfills is a shared concern of Mana Whenua, whether its risks arising from: • air quality / discharge to air (leading to risk to health) • contamination of whenua/land (to Papatūānuku) • activities in proximity to wāhi tapu and cultural heritage sites This shared value would also include certainty around the closure and rehabilitation of the Redvale Landfill.
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5 Recommendations

The following recommendations have been put forward to WMNZ for consideration and further discussion with relevant Mana Whenua.

Recommendations	Explanation
1 Continued Engagement with Mana Whenua & Consideration of Cultural/Mana Whenua Values in Technical Reports	The values and interests of Mana Whenua that are identified within the CVA report will need to be presented to, discussed and progressed further with, Mana Whenua. The input and clarity from Mana Whenua is needed to ensure effects/impacts are identified and understood, as well as obtain feedback on the recommended measures of the CVA report (and other technical reports) are deemed appropriate by Mana Whenua to provide for, and respond to, their values and interests in the activities at Redvale Landfill. Also, the recommendation requires the consideration of Mana Whenua values and interests by the expertise commissioned to prepare technical reports for WMNZ.
2 Establish a Mana Whenua Governance Committee for Redvale Landfill & Supporting Relationship Agreement	To recognise and provide for the Rangatiratanga and Kaitiakitanga of Mana Whenua at Redvale Landfill, it is recommended that a Mana Whenua Governance Committee is established. The intent of the committee is to recognise customary authority (and ahi kā) of Mana Whenua, and to enhance their involvement in all aspects of management, monitoring, cultural assessment and governance at Redvale Landfill. It is viewed that the committee will provide a platform for Mana Whenua to take leadership roles for the enhancement and restorative activities proposed within, and in proximity to, the Redvale Landfill site. Also, it is proposed that those Mana Whenua who are party to the recommended Mana Whenua Governance Committee are supported with individual relationship agreements (e.g. Memoranda of Understanding).

3 Inclusion of Mana Whenua Values, and the Role of Kaitiaki, in Management Plans	Management Plans play an important role to ensure conditions of resource consent are met. The inclusion of Mana Whenua values, and kaitiaki, is to enable a holistic understanding of potential effects from the Redvale Landfill operation and establish methods and practices to be implemented to reduce any anticipated/real impacts. This recommendation is in addition to the role/function of the Mana Whenua Governance Committee to review and input into all management plans prior to submission to Auckland Council.
4 Kaitiaki Monitoring	The recommendation seeks to enable Mana Whenua to implement their respective mātauranga founded framework for monitoring at Redvale Landfill. This includes any digital/technological device that supports with their kaitiaki/cultural monitoring, and access to any relevant monitoring data and information.
5 Enhancement and Restoration Measures & Establish Exclusionary Areas	Enhancement of native biodiversity at the Redvale Landfill site, in addition to the existing pockets of vegetation, are recommended. Similarly with measures to manage water quality. It is recommended that restoration/enhancement of Rangitōpuni Stream and other connected water features are implemented. Also, it is considered that areas where restoration efforts are established, these are mapped and physically demarcated onsite to ensure protection.
6 Commitment for Redvale Landfill to cease accepting waste by 2036 & Rehabilitation Plan (includes Aftercare and Monitoring Plan)	The idea behind the Rehabilitation Plan is to encourage a reciprocity/utu, a payment, or contribution, back to Papatūānuku. The intent is to enable open-minded discussions regarding the progressive closure of landfill areas, and commencement of any rehabilitation of those areas whilst expanding the current Redvale Landfill as part of the fast-track project.

6 Conclusions

The CVA report complements the engagement with Mana Whenua that is being led by WMNZ's Managing Director Evan Maehl and Independent Engagement Lead Terrence 'Mook' Hohneck. Whetū has not participated directly in any engagement between WMNZ and Mana Whenua.

Whetū anticipates that the values and interests of Mana Whenua identified within the CVA report will be presented to, discussed and progressed further with, Mana Whenua after the lodgement of the referral application as part of the continued consultation and engagement activities between WMNZ and Mana Whenua.

7 Applicability

This report has been prepared for the exclusive use of our client WMNZ, with respect to the particular brief given to us, and it may not be relied upon in other contexts or for any other purpose, or by any person other than our client, without our prior written agreement.
