### **Permitted Activity Assessment**

### 1 Introduction

Consideration has been given as to whether any of the proposed works could rely on permitted activity provisions within the relevant plans. It has been determined that a number of components comply with the relevant permitted activity standards. By location, these components of the Project include:

#### **Sutton Block Site:**

- Lighting
- Noise (Mixed Rural zone area of the pit)
- Vibration (Mixed Rural zone area of the pit)
- Blasting (Mixed Rural zone area of the pit)
- Onsite offset:
  - Planting
  - Forest enhancement (pest-plant management)
  - Riparian planting

### **Hingaia Island Site:**

- Offsite offset:
  - Planting

### **Tuakau Site:**

- Offsite offset:
  - Riparian planting
  - Wetland habitat creation

In accordance with Schedule 5, clause 5(5)(a) of the Fast-track Approvals Act 2024 (FTAA), a permitted activity assessment under the relevant plans is provided for each of these sites.

### 2 Sutton Block

As stated above, the Project involves lighting, operational noise, and construction noise and vibration/blasting. A significant programme of ecological enhancement and restoration is also proposed to address the ecological effects of the project which cannot be avoided, remedied, or mitigated. The onsite ecological package includes a total of 57 ha of revegetation (involving planting of 887 relict trees) and 108 ha of native forest enhancement (involving pest-plant management).

As demonstrated below, these onsite activities are assessed as being permitted under the Auckland Unitary Plan – Operative in Part (AUP).

### 2.1 Auckland Unitary Plan

The zones and notations applying to the Site under the AUP are listed in Section \*\* of the AEE. The permitted activities that are relied upon as part of the Project are identified below in Table 2.1.

The assessment above considers that the onsite activities specified above, are permitted under the relevant provisions of the Auckland Unitary Plan.

# 3 Hingaia Island offset site

The overall ecological offset measures also include planting at Ngā Motu o Hingaia Island within the Pahurehure Inlet of the Manukau Harbour (Hingaia Island Site). Specifically, a total of 5 ha of Kanuka Scrub/Forest (VS2) and ten groups of Totara Trees (a total of 113 trees) are to be planted at Hingaia Island. The planting of totara trees is to replace the loss of mature Totara trees proposed to be

removed as part of the Sutton Block development. The proposed planting is limited to the middle of the three islands.

This activity is assessed as being a permitted activity under the AUP as demonstrated below.

# 3.1 Auckland Unitary Plan

The general zoning and planning limitations that apply to the site under the AUP are set out in Table 3.1 below. The permitted activities are identified below in Table 3.2.

The assessment above considers that the proposed ecological offset programme at Hingaia Island is a permitted activity under the relevant provisions of the Auckland Unitary Plan.

#### 4 Tuakau offset site

The proposed ecological offset programme for the Project includes planting, stream and wetland offset works at 86 Friedlander Road, Tuakau (Tuakau Site). The Tuakau Site is located approximately 16 km south-east of the quarry, within the Waikato Region and the Waikato District.

In terms of terrestrial offset, relict tree replacement planting of kahikatea, pukatea, and rimu is proposed at the Tuakau site with specific measures proposed to achieve the expected biodiversity outcomes. In total, 628 young trees (kahikatea, pukatea, rimu) will be planted across 1.14 ha adjacent to existing protected kahikatea forest. Indigenous tree and vegetation species will not be removed or replaced.

Residual effects for the loss of aquatic habitat that cannot be addressed on the Sutton Block site, will be addressed through offset at the Tuakau Site. Specifically, a total stream length of 740 m at the Western Stream and 1,549 m at the Tutaenui Stream is proposed to be enhanced through riparian planting at the Tuakau Site. Additionally, 4.04 ha of wetland will be restored, including the creation of new wetland habitat. This restoration and enhancement is intended to provide for a positive aquatic ecological benefit, habitat creation, biodiversity gains, and restore connectivity to existing habitats.

Overall, all offset works at the Tuakau site involve planting as the primary activity and consideration has been given below as to whether this is provided for as a permitted activity under the Waikato

District Plan – Operative in Part, Operative District Plan – Franklin Section and the Waikato Regional Plan.

### 4.1 Waikato District Plan – Operative in Part

Waikato District Council published the "Waikato District Plan - Operative in Part" on 30 October 2024. This version of the Waikato District Plan - Operative in Part identifies which provisions are operative, and those provisions that are subject to appeal. As a result of the latest update (on 20 March 2025), annotations have been removed where they no longer apply.

Given the number of district wide provisions subject to appeal, for the purposes of this application, all relevant district wide provisions have been included where they have legal effect under Section 86B of the RMA. Separately below the existing provisions in the Operative Plan are included also to demonstrate overall compliance with PA standards.

The general zoning and planning limitations that apply to the site are set out in Table 4.1 below. The permitted activities are identified below in Table 4.2.

For the purposes of this application, the proposed ecological offset programme is assessed against both the Franklin and Waikato Sections of the Operative Waikato District Plan. The general zoning and planning limitations under the Operative District Plan are set out in Table 4.3 below.
