	From the draft documents provided it appears a resource consent is sought
	under the RMA 1991.
	From a review of the information provided prior to 3 April and a verbal
	discussion with the applicants consultant, it was recommended that the
	information provided in the substantive application prepared under the Fast-
	track Approvals Act 2024 be separated out by the various approvals sought (if multiple approvals required) and all information requirements addressed. Use of
	clear headings for each information requirement would assist with navigating
	the documents.

	The FTAA Wildlife Approvals Checklist provided on 3 April addresses the
	information requirements in Schedule 7. From a review of this document the
	following observations are made:
	It is noted the Wildlife approval seeks to capture and relocate native skinks.
	Approval would be required to capture live, kill and liberate.
	The document references addressing the requirements of cl 2(1)(n) of Schedule
	7 are missing and should be updated prior to lodging the substantive application
	No comments have been provided to address the requirements of cl 2(1)(o). It
	would be useful for additional reports or advice received to be referenced in the
	table.

There is no information provided to consider the effects as a result of clearance of significant indigenous vegetation as part of the resource consent application.

Any documents and supporting reports should be referenced and named.

It is recommended that the applicant identify and apply for all necessary approvals required for the project under the Fast-track Approvals Act 2024, including any potential concessions or complex freshwater fisheries activities.

No approvals are required if the culverts do not impede fish passage. The updated Fish Passage Guidelines (Version 2.0) set out best-practice approaches and design standards for providing fish passage: https://niwa.co.nz/freshwater/fish-passage-home/new-zealand-fish-passage-quidelines.
