2. The authority holder must ensure that Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga is advised of the completion of the on-site archaeological work, within two working days of completion.
3. The authority holder must ensure that all contractors carrying out works that will or may potentially modify archaeological sites are briefed by the s45 approved person (who may appoint a person to carry out the briefing on their behalf), prior to any works commencing, on the archaeological work required by the conditions of this authority.
4. The authority must be exercised in accordance with the management plan attached to the authority application. Any changes to the plan require the prior written agreement of Heritage New Zealand Pouhere Taonga.
5. Appropriate marking of sites and site features (including any buffer margins), with high visibility materials, must be undertaken in consultation with the s45 approved person prior to works commencing.
