## RMA s178(2) consent for the Belmont Quarry Development Project in relation to the requirement for designation WRC-15 Belmont Regional Park

I refer to Winstone Aggregates' agreement with the Wellington Regional Council (WRC, hereafter "Greater Wellington") dated 10 October 2025 in which Greater Wellington indicated that it would provide the necessary Resource Management Act 1991 (RMA) s178 consent for the Belmont Quarry Development Project, should it be granted approvals under the Fast-Track Approvals Act 2024.

This notice confirms that Greater Wellington provides its written consent as requiring authority, subject to conditions, under s178(2) of the Resource Management Act 1991.

This consent is provided by Greater Wellington as requiring authority for designation WRC-15 and is for the activity described as the Belmont Quarry Development in Schedule 2 of the Fast-track Approvals Act 2024 (FTAA 2024). Further consent will need to be sought for any other works affecting the Greater Wellington designation, or on Greater Wellington owned or managed land.

Condition(s) of Designation consent are:

1. This consent is valid in perpetuity from 14 November 2025 and applies before, during and after the consideration of the Belmont Quarry Project under the FTAA 2024 process.
2. This consent is nullified and withdrawn if, for any reason, the approvals for the Belmont Quarry Project are declined under the FTAA 2024 process, or the approvals lapse.

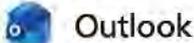
Notes in relation to Designation consent are:

- a) Greater Wellington agrees that if Winstone receives approval for the exchange under the Act, then it will not advance its Notice of Requirement for a designation in the Overburden Disposal Area any further and will seek to either alter its designation (section 181) or remove its designation (section 182) so that it no longer covers the Overburden Disposal Area.
- b) Greater Wellington agrees that if the exchange is implemented by Winstone, then after new titles are issued for the land it will not advance its Notice of Requirement for a designation in the Overburden Disposal Area any further, and will seek to either alter its designation (section 181) or remove its designation (section 182) so that it no longer covers the Overburden Disposal Area.

Please find the attached information relevant to the upcoming Fast Track application from Winstone Aggregates to expand the Belmont quarry.

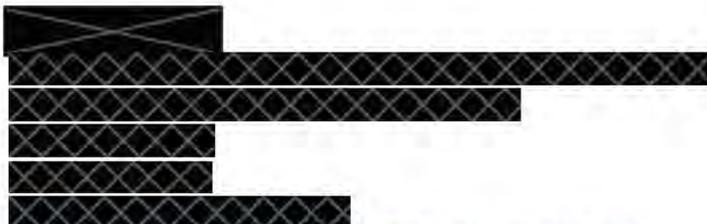
In providing the attached information, Greater Wellington notes the following:

- Greater Wellington is neutral on the proposed land exchange proposal.
- The neutral position held by Greater Wellington has not involved any determination of ecological or conservation value as DOC is accountable for making that determination.

We hope that the provision of the attached information supports DOC’s role in considering the application under sections 33 and 34 of the Act. Greater Wellington also considers the attached information as complete and comprehensive regarding DOC’s role to invite written comments from Greater Wellington both as the administering body and a requiring authority under section 35(1)(a), which points to 53(2)(a). (Please note that we are not providing this email as a local authority or consent authority under the RMA).

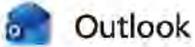
Regarding s.35(a)(l) – that DOC will invite written comments from any requiring authority that has a designation on land to which the substantive application relates or on land adjacent to that land - as a requiring authority that has given a Notice of Requirement for a designation to Hutt City Council over the proposed Belmont Quarry development Project land (being the DOC-give areas); it is expected that the applicant – Winstone Aggregates – will apply for Notice of Requirement/Designation consent from Greater Wellington, and Greater Wellington will provide this consent as and when required during the FTAA process.

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**Winstones Aggregates Belmont Quarry**

**Proposed land exchange - Information pack to support decision making**

**1. Introduction**

Winstone Aggregates (WA) is proposing to extend the Belmont Quarry site in Lower Hutt to allow for the establishment of a new overburden disposal area adjacent to the existing quarry. To progress this proposal, WA is seeking a land exchange with the Department of Conservation (DoC) and approval under the Fast-Track Approvals Act 2024.

The DoC land being considered as part of the land exchange proposal falls within Belmont Regional Park which is managed by Greater Wellington Regional Council (GW). DoC will consider the land exchange proposal by WA and GWRC will provide DoC with information held by GW around the terrestrial and freshwater information within the land exchange areas being considered.

This memo summarises the information GW holds in respect to the terrestrial and freshwater of the land exchange areas. The information presented in this memo was gathered from a desktop assessment of geospatial data, expert knowledge within the GW Knowledge and Insights and Delivery functions and various documents held by GW. No site-specific visits, ecological surveys or assessment of the values have been undertaken by GW staff in the four

parcels of land being considered as part of the proposed land exchange to support the compilation of this memo.

At the time of drafting this memo GW received information relating to this proposal from the Friends of Belmont Regional Park (FoBRP). This information has been appended to this memo (Attachment 1). GW has not undertaken any analysis of this information and is neutral regarding the quality or accuracy of this information.

## 2. Site context and proposed land exchange areas

WA is proposing to exchange two parcels of land in the Belmont Quarry and one parcel of land in the nearby Dry Creek Quarry in exchange for an area of DoC public conservation land presently captured in the Belmont Regional Park in Lower Hutt (Table 1 & Map 1).

The public conservation land (DoC owned) land mentioned above falls within the Belmont -Dry Creek Key Native Ecosystem (KNE) site which is managed as part of the GW KNE Programme<sup>1</sup>. The KNE programme provides long term funding to support the protection and enhancement of the natural values present within the site through weed control and pest animal control. A [KNE Operational Plan for Belmont-Dry Creek](#) has been developed to guide the management support delivered to this site through the GW KNE Programme.

Parts of the Northern Gully and Firth blocks of land contain Queen Elizabeth II National Trust open space covenants which means these areas are protected in perpetuity under the legal title of the land.

### 3. Terrestrial and Freshwater Information

Key environmental information held by GW was identified with a desk top assessment of the four land parcels being considered for a land exchange. This information is shown in Attachment 2.

Attachment 3 is a vegetation map surveyed by Boffa Miskell in 2017 showing the area around the proposed overburden area. The proposed overburden area shown on this map by the white line differs from the boundary of the present Winstone Aggregate proposal which has been revised since this map was created.

<b>DoC Land BRP</b>	<p>Historically, this land would have been vegetation predominantly in the Regionally Threatened M7 tawa, kamahi, podocarp forest (Singers <i>et al</i> 2018).</p> <p>Boffa Miskell (2017) conducted a vegetation survey in this area being considered for the land exchange. Eight vegetation communities were identified in this area. A detailed description of these vegetation communities is provided in section 3.1 on page 14 of Boffa Miskell (2017) and the map of these communities is in Appendix 1.</p> <p>Some of the key points from this survey are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Small areas of semi-swamp forest characterised by the presence of the Regionally Uncommon swamp maire (shown in a brown colour in Appendix 1). These patches were found in stream gullies on the gentler slopes adjacent to the western side of this land exchange area – the closest patch being within about 50 m of the boundary. This stream then drains through a steep gully clad in regenerating early successional forest, conveyed under SH2 before discharging into Te Awa Kairangi/Hutt River. A detailed description of the stream habitat is provided in Boffa Miskell (2017) and is referred to as the 'Eastern Stream'. This stream has been identified as having high MCI values (Schedule F1 of the Natural Resources Plan: River and Lakes with significant indigenous) in its lower reaches below this land parcel.</p> <p>A second unnamed tributary flows close to the western corner of this parcel of land then through the Northern gully before entering the quarry lake and eventually discharging into Te Awa Kairangi/Hutt River from under SH2. A fish survey undertaken by Boffa Miskell in 2022 in this western tributary found the regionally declining and nationally at risk declining long fin eel (<i>Anguilla dieffenbachii</i>), the Not Threatened short fin eel (<i>Anguilla australis</i>) and koura. We expect these streams in this area to hold these species and potentially other native freshwater fish species.</p>		<p>Twelve possum/predator control sites are present either within or on the boundary of this land parcel funded through the KNE programme. These sites are spread across three main pest control access routes that run through the land exchange area. Access to these routes which continue west and east of the area is from the ridge that passes through the middle of the area. New access routes would need to be established if the land exchange takes place.</p> <p>Control of ecological weeds has been undertaken annually in this area for the last 15 years funded by the KNE programme.</p>

Dear [Redacted],

I'm writing on behalf of the Friends of Belmont Regional Park (FoBRP), about the proposed land-swap with Winstone Aggregates (WA). As you'll be aware, the land that WA want to acquire is public land, part of a Key Native Ecosystem, owned by DoC, and managed by GWRC. WA have claimed that the park land is of low ecological value, but that is clearly not the case.

DoC are currently considering whether to accept or decline WA's proposed land-swap, and GWRC will be asked to comment to DoC on that. The FoBRP have been working hard over the last year to better define the ecology of the park land in question, and have discovered some important species that the WA's own eco-surveys appear to have missed entirely.

We (FoBRP) want to ensure that GW is aware of all these findings, and our concerns about the land-swap, to better inform their comments to DoC.

Initially, I'll present the main points here, but we would be glad to call in and talk to the key people in person at any time. We're also greatly aware of the urgency of all of this, and would be happy to take any GW or DoC staff in to see the area for themselves. The botanical findings seem to be increasing by the week, and are all visible on iNaturalist, eg via this link (with a couple of screen-grabs attached to this Email) :

In summary :

- Currently 16 observations of Swamp Maire (Threatened - Nationally Vulnerable)
- 20 observations of Ramarama (Threatened - Nationally Critical)
- these populations are well protected here. Nationally they are both at risk from Myrtle rust.
- WA have recently reduced the area they wish to use, to avoid the first of these Swamp Maire populations, but may not be aware of the rest
- To protect these swamp-loving plants also requires careful conservation of their upstream water catchments.
- We have also found Coprosma rubra (At Risk – Declining)
- **Overall, the area in question has a rich diversity of plant life, with 98 species noted so far**
- **In particular, the shallow valley trending SSE towards the large pond is a particularly rich and valuable habitat**
- Potentially, that area could become the perfect focus for a new walkway, which would significantly enhance community connection.
  
- The DoC/GWRC land in question is not just regenerating farmland; it is part of a KNE which contains original landforms, wetlands and streams, and incised gullies with original native forest. This land is protected by a well-maintained network of bait-lines.
- The proposed land-swap would destroy the original landforms and fragment the structure of this part of the regional park
- Two parcels of the WA land proposed for the swap are already protected by a QEII covenant
- The QEII protection was a resource consent requirement for a previous quarry expansion. It has already been traded for other land.
- **The proposed land-swap does not offer any net ecological gain, but instead a significant ecological loss.**
- Should the land-swap and fast-track proposal go ahead, the FoBRP would be extremely concerned about the financial burden that would be placed on public funds for remediation, should WA, their parent company, or a later new owner, fail. A significant bond would need to be set aside to counter that possibility, but we have seen no mention of that in the WA proposals.
  
- **The recreational value of Belmont Regional Park would be significantly reduced by the land-swap**

- Access to the QEII-covenanted WA land would be impossible, given that the access from the north would be blocked by WA earthworks, and access from the south is too steep to access (the GW contractors even find it challenging).

- WA have recently stated that "*We see genuine ecological and community value in this land becoming part of the Belmont Regional Park, creating more space for everyone to explore, connect with nature, and enjoy for generations to come.*". But that could not work if the area is inaccessible.

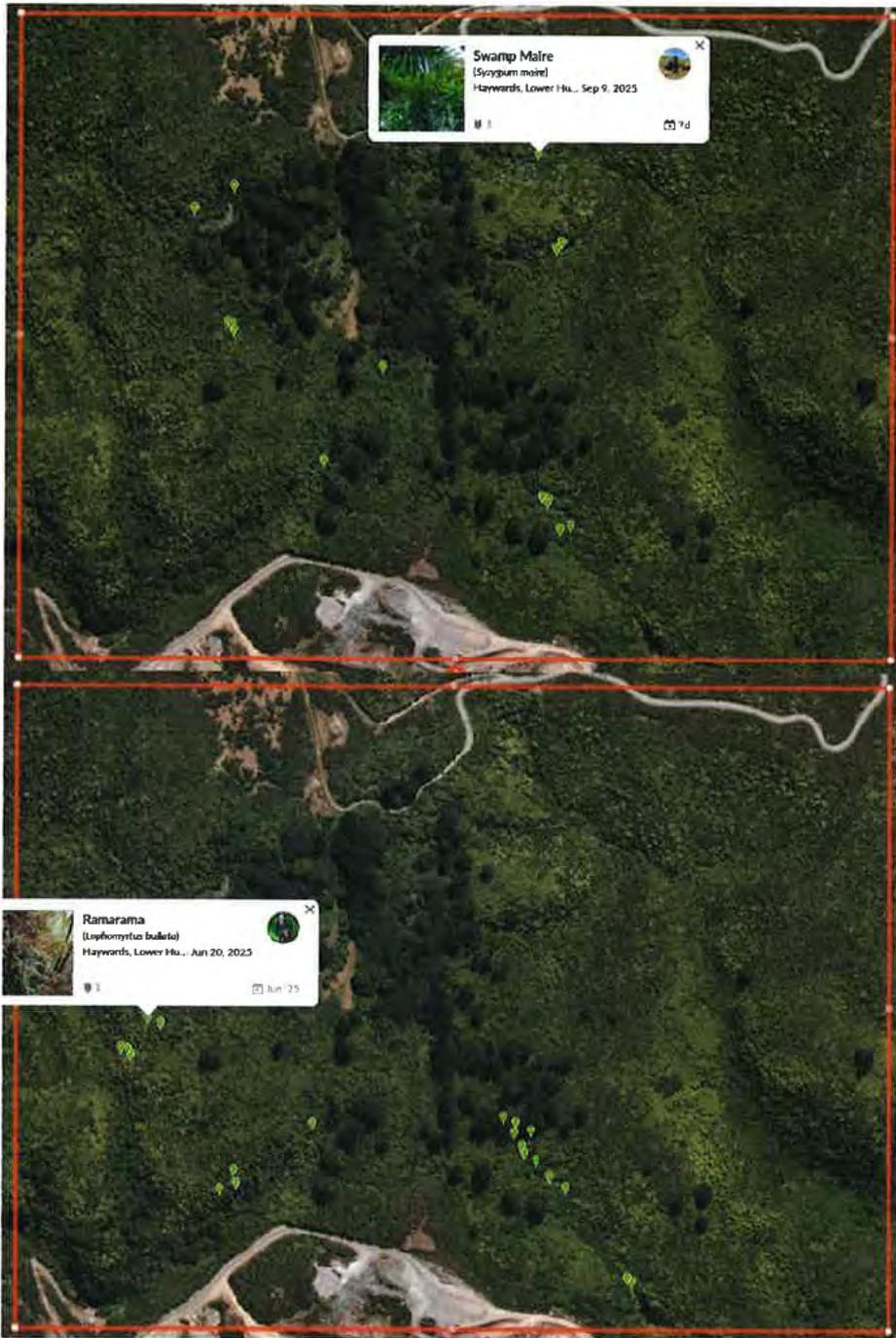

### Proposed land-swap by Winstone Aggregates

Tēnā koe [REDACTED],

I am writing on behalf of the Wellington Botanical Society. We have a membership of approximately 200 professional and amateur botanists. We aim to encourage the study of botany (particularly New Zealand flora), foster an interest in New Zealand's native plants, and advocate for the protection, under protected area statutes, of lands and waters.

With these aims, we wish to express our concern of, and opposition to, the proposal to swap DOC land for private land for use as an overburden deposit site. We understand this area to be within [the rectangle represented here](#).

We wish to bring a few matters to the attention of the project team at DOC considering the overburden proposal.

First, is recent research on maire tawake *Syzygium maire* in the Wellington region published by the School of Biological Sciences at Victoria University.<sup>1</sup> The authors highlight that we 'need to identify refugia in accessible, albeit sometimes fragmented, habitat' and recommend 'leveraging human-nature interactions in areas to create, expand, and protect habitat for [this] rare species in a rapidly changing world'. *Syzygium maire* has a threat classification of Threatened-Nationally Vulnerable.<sup>2</sup> The article illustrates that *Syzygium maire*'s preferred habitat of waterlogged areas in the Wellington region are few and shrinking.

Second, is the number of recently observed *Syzygium maire* in the proposed overburden deposit site. These can be seen at [this link](#). Given that their habitat is shrinking, an area that hosts so many *Syzygium maire* is, in our view, rare and precious.

Third, a large proportion of the land area under consideration for development is classified as a Category 1 threatened environment, indicating that less than 10% indigenous land cover of this type

remains intact in Aotearoa New Zealand.<sup>3</sup> This is the most threatened status allowed by this classification. Other species recorded in the area at risk are *Coprosma rubra* (with a national threat status of declining and regional status of uncommon) and *Lophomyrtus bullata* (with a national threat status of nationally critical and regional status of critical).

We hope this information is of use to the project team at DOC.

**Statement on Remnant Swamp Forest Habitat near Dry Creek, Belmont Regional Park**

Tēnā koutou katoa

I am writing to provide a statement on the remnant swamp forest habitat near Dry Creek in Belmont Regional Park, with specific reference to the proposed land swap with Winstone Aggregates.

I am a both an academic researcher and concerned member of the public. The body of my work has dealt with locating and conserving the nationally critically threatened tree swamp maire (*Syzygium maire*)<sup>1,2,3</sup>. I have visited and assessed many habitats and remnant patches across Aotearoa, and thus have the expertise to identify high quality habitat for the species.

At the request of Friends of Belmont Regional Park, I visited the proposed land swap site on the 25<sup>th</sup> of September 2025. I observed healthy swamp maire trees of various ages, at least two of which were likely original and seeded prior to land clearance. These trees are therefore not only of historical value, but also harbour a snapshot of the ancestral genetic diversity of the region prior to deforestation. They therefore represent living fossils, and any seed they produce is of high value. The habitat as a whole is well suited to swamp maire and other swamp forest plants.

Of specific note is the site's relative isolation from other swamp maire remnants, and its ease of access, both which are important components of protecting these trees from myrtle rust<sup>4</sup>. Isolation means reinfection is less likely, and accessibility allows monitoring and control to be more easily carried out by members of the public.

Greater Wellington has lost over 95% of its swampland habitat<sup>5,6</sup>. Any remaining swamps, and the plants they contain, should therefore be considered irreplaceable, and it is hard to envisage how the proposed swap could provide land that is as ecologically valuable as the park land considered for exchange.

- Hutt City Council agrees that its legal interest in the Land under the Encumbrance is unaffected by the proposed land exchange; and
- To the extent required, Hutt City Council as holder of a legal interest in the Land under the Encumbrance gives its agreement to the land exchange proposed by Winstone Aggregates (pursuant to schedule 6, clause 31(1)(b) of the Fast-track Approvals Act 2024).

We understand that the land to be exchanged may not be accepted as reserve land with the encumbrance in place. Given that the purpose for which the encumbrance is provided (protection of vegetation) is already redundant, due to the existing QEII covenant and the subsequent land swap, HCC confirms in principle that it has no objection to and will provide its written approval to discharge the encumbrance as part of the exchange, (if needed) subject to receiving and reviewing the relevant paperwork.

Hutt City Council's agreement as recorded in this letter is provided in its capacity as holder of a legal interest in the Land under the Encumbrance. This letter is not approval or endorsement of the proposed land exchange in Hutt City Council's capacity as territorial authority or consent authority under the Resource Management Act 1991.

## **Update: Addition of Southern Gully to Land Exchange**

### Purpose

The purpose of this memo is to confirm recent changes to the land exchange proposal. The Southern Gully has been added to the exchange package, and experts reports now need to be updated to incorporate this addition. All other areas of exchange land remain the same, this will result in additional land being provided to DOC as part of the DOC "get" area.

### Southern Gully (3.9ha)

Following consultation with the Department of Conservation and in order to contribute to a higher conservation value, the Southern Gully block has been added into the DOC-Get exchange package. See Figure 1 below. The area shown in yellow line is excluded from the DOC-Get area.

The Southern Gully area is approximately 3.9 ha in area, and straddles Lots 4, 5 DP 322126. Part of Lots 4 and 5 DP 322126 will be subdivided as part of the DOC-Get land, with the balance of Lots 4 and 5 remaining in FCIL Ownership as a new allotment.

The proposed Southern Gully extension encompasses the upper-middle reach of a small catchment located to the southwest of the existing Cottle Block OBDA. This catchment drains the upper section of Kaitangata Road and runs between Liverton Road and Belmont Quarry before discharging into Te Awa Kairangi. The proposed exchange area encompasses the lower slopes on both sides of the gully and is situated within the land of Fletcher Concrete and Infrastructure Limited (FCIL). The area also includes a small north-facing gully that leads up to the existing road frontage with Liverton Road.

The Southern Gully covers an area of approximately 4 ha and is located on the floor of an open section of the catchment which runs from north to south. After passing through the wetland area, the unnamed stream flows through a steeper gorge-like section before falling down a series of waterfalls, after which it joins Te Awa Kairangi. The Southern Gully is likely present due to a range of seepages from the surrounding hills, as well as the waterfalls downstream acting as a natural barrier that impedes flows and backs up groundwater within the wetland area.

The Southern Gully area is zoned Rural under both the Operative and Proposed District

Plans.

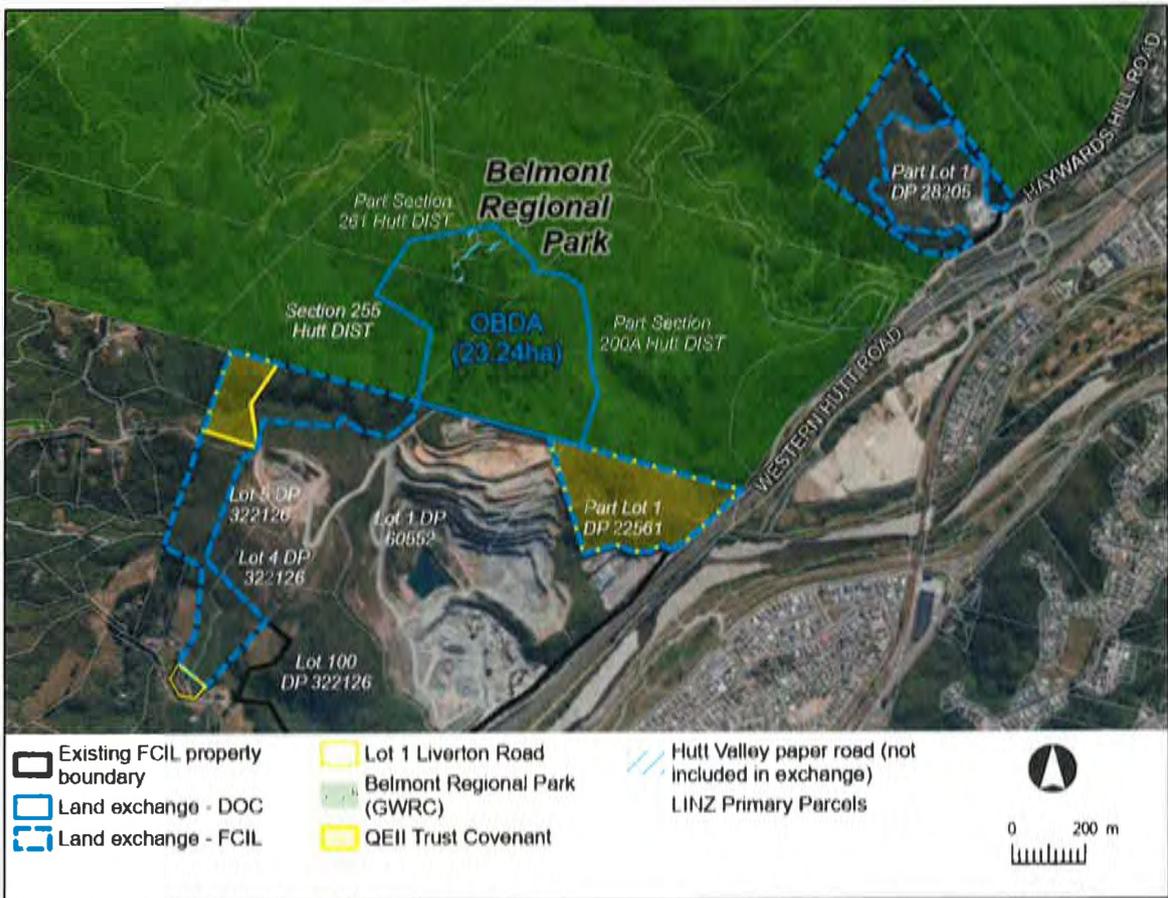


Figure 2: Map of land exchange parcels

## MEMORANDUM

### *Introduction*

1. This memorandum sets out the position of Queen Elizabeth the Second National Trust (QEII) regarding Winstone Aggregates' proposed Belmont Quarry Development (Application FTA308).
2. The details of the proposed development were first formally presented to QEII at our offices on 8 July 2025. Winstone Aggregates was represented by [REDACTED] and [REDACTED], and its barrister, [REDACTED].

While the immediate effects of the proposed development (i.e. overburden covering regenerating indigenous vegetation) are inconsistent with QEII's ethos of protection of indigenous biodiversity, QEII's primary interest in this development is that the purpose and objectives of open space covenant 5-07-755 (instrument no. 10476608.1) are upheld, and the open space values protected by this covenant are not compromised.

6. The purpose and objectives of open space covenant 5-07-755 are as follows:

The Covenantor and the National Trust agree that the purpose of this deed is to protect, maintain and enhance the Open Space Values of the Covenant Area and in particular to achieve the following objectives:

- Protection and enhancement of the natural character of the Covenant Area with particular regard to the indigenous flora and fauna;
- Maintenance and enhancement of the landscape value of the Covenant Area;
- Enhance the contribution that the Covenant Area makes to the protection of indigenous biodiversity, by encouraging (where appropriate) the restoration of indigenous vegetation cover on the Covenant Area; and
- Prevention of subdivision (within the meaning of the Resource Management Act 1991 or any other equivalent replacement legislation) of the Covenant Area.

7. Regardless of ownership status, QEII will continue to monitor open space covenant 5-07-755 and ensure its purpose and objectives are upheld, as it has since this covenant was registered in 2016.

We support the proposed enhancement planting along the cut edge of the Firth block (Block B of the covenant). We suggest adding kānuka (*Kunzea ericoides*) into the mix, and note the relative hardiness of each species should determine their placement in relation to the exposed cut edge, for a successful outcome. We note that any species planted should be locally sourced and site-appropriate.

We support the proposed pest plant and animal control in the Cottle block (which includes part of Block A of the covenant). Can you please let us know whether these will be one-off activities, or sustained by Winstone Aggregates for a period of time? Please also let us know whether possum control is currently being undertaken in this area.

Before providing our support for the proposed track into the top of Block A, we need more information about what the track would look like, how this would impact the protected vegetation and what the track would be used for. Please provide information regarding these points when you can. Allowing for a track within the covenant area would require a variation to the covenant deed, which requires approval from our Executive (acting under delegated authority from our Board).

As I mentioned at the site visit the track was still under consideration. Further expert assessment has **removed** the track on top of Block A. We are no longer proposing a track through the QEII in the Northern Gully.

We have confirmed with  (our ecologist) kānuka can be added in the Firth Block QEII covenant and acknowledge species planted need to be hard edge species resilient to winds. These will be locally eco-sourced.

WA currently does not undertake any possum control in the Cottle Block. Our pest management is focused on weed control and animal pest such as rabbit/ hares and occasional goats in consistent with the Greater Wellington Regional Council's Pest Management Strategy. The weed and pest control through the Cottle Block is recommended to occur for the first 5 years after the exchange occurs.

Hopefully that answers your question. We'd appreciate if you were able to send through a memo to confirm QEII's position so that it makes it more streamlined for both of our records.

This letter relates to Winstone Aggregates Belmont Quarry Development listed project, and particularly the initial land exchange application. We understand that the land exchange application is being progressed in advance of the resource consent applications. We also acknowledge that consultation has commenced in relation to the resource consent applications but is ongoing.

Thank you for your continued engagement on the resource consent applications and land exchange.

**Transpower assets on the land subject to the application**

Transpower has statutory access rights under the Electricity Act 1992 that enable two separate and independent transmission lines to cross the land that is to be swapped and become part of the Winstone Belmont quarry.

The Haywards - Melling B (HAY-MLG-B) is a 110kV transmission line that is closest to the existing quarry activity. The land identified for inclusion in the quarry contains two support towers on this line.

The Oteranga Bay - Haywards A (OTB-HAY-A) is capable of operating at 350kV and is the northern most of the two lines. The land identified for inclusion in the quarry contains two support towers on this line.

Worth noting is that both lines are part of the critical High Voltage DC (HVDC) link that conveys electricity between the North and South Islands. This link is nationally significant.

Existing access tracks maintained by Transpower are located within the land area to be transferred to the quarry. These tracks provide vehicular access to the line support towers for the transmission

lines identified above. While the access tracks used and maintained by Transpower cross small segments of the legal road to be stopped, the access tracks do not rely on, or follow, the legal road.

The National Grid is generally not protected by easements or designations. Transpower relies on statutory rights under the Electricity Act to enable lines, including their support towers and conductors (wires), to be located on and above the land they cross and for a right of access to maintain the assets. The National Environmental Standards for Electricity Transmission Activities (NESETA) authorises works on the lines.

### **Land exchange**

Winstone is progressing a land exchange with the Department of Conservation. Transpower understands that the proposed land exchange is required to facilitate further development of the aggregate resource, and the newly acquired land will be used for the establishment of an engineered overburden landform and an operational buffer area that will include amenity and ecological restoration planting.

The land exchange and future construction of the engineered landform (which is not part of the land swap, but would be enabled by the proposal), would result in loss of the existing access track used by Transpower for maintenance and upgrading of the lines (including their support towers and conductors). However, Winstone and Transpower have agreed that alternative, suitable vehicular access that meets Transpower's requirements can be established in the event that the land swap proceeds and future work on the land precludes the use of the current access track.

Transpower has reviewed the draft plans for the alternative access provided during consultation, including:

1. Site plan from Boffa Miskell, dated 17 September 2025; and
2. Scheme Plans SC-01 to SC-06 (Rev D) from Adamson Shaw, dated 15 September 2025.

Transpower confirms that, based on the information supplied, National Grid assets and operations are not adversely impacted by the proposed land exchange. Specifically:

- The Electricity Act grants Transpower the right to access tower structures situated on the land proposed for exchange. The land swap itself will not alter the current use of the property or access via the existing track. However, the exchange will provide Winstone with the opportunity to apply for approval to utilise the acquired land for quarry operations, which may affect the current access route. Although this is subject to a future substantive application, Winstone and Transpower have reached an agreement that alternative access can be arranged. It is anticipated that this matter could be addressed as a condition of any subsequent substantive approval for the use of the land.
- Transpower's statutory access rights under the *Electricity Act 1992* are not altered by the change in land ownership/management and no additional easements or rights-of-way are required.

Given the above, Transpower has no objection to the proposed land exchange proceeding. We look forward to continued engagement with Winstone Aggregates as the application advances, to ensure infrastructure considerations remain integrated into the process.

**Fast-track process – comments**

We expect that Transpower will be asked to provide comments in relation to the land exchange application, as Transpower is an “other person” (section 17(5)), due to being an occupier of the land to which the substantive application relates and the land adjacent to that land (section 53(2)(i)).

We are comfortable with this letter being provided to the Environmental Protection Authority and Director General of Conservation as part of your application.

## **Update: Addition of Southern Gully to Land Exchange**

### Purpose

The purpose of this memo is to confirm recent changes to the land exchange proposal. The Southern Gully has been added to the exchange package, and experts reports now need to be updated to incorporate this addition. All other areas of exchange land remain the same, this will result in additional land being provided to DOC as part of the DOC "get" area.

### Southern Gully (3.9ha)

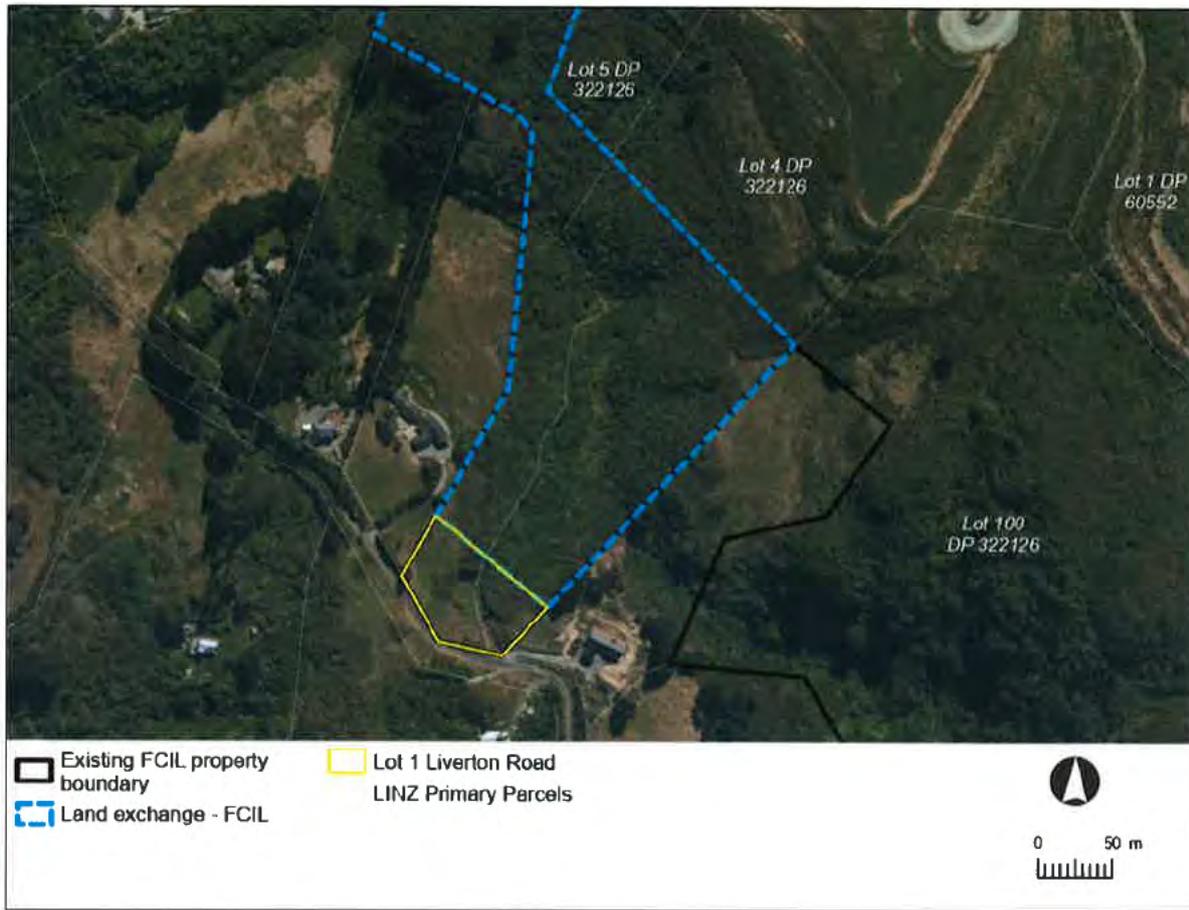


Figure 1: Southern Gully

Following consultation with the Department of Conservation and in order to contribute to a higher conservation value, the Southern Gully block has been added into the DOC-Get exchange package. See Figure 1 below. The area shown in yellow line is excluded from the DOC-Get area.

The Southern Gully area is approximately 3.9 ha in area, and straddles Lots 4, 5 DP 322126. Part of Lots 4 and 5 DP 322126 will be subdivided as part of the DOC-Get land, with the balance of Lots 4 and 5 remaining in FCIL Ownership as a new allotment.

The proposed Southern Gully extension encompasses the upper-middle reach of a small catchment located to the southwest of the existing Cottle Block OBDA. This catchment drains the upper section of Kaitangata Road and runs between Liverton Road and Belmont Quarry before discharging into Te Awa Kairangi. The proposed exchange area encompasses the lower slopes on both sides of the gully and is situated within the land of Fletcher Concrete and Infrastructure Limited (FCIL). The area also includes a small north-facing gully that leads up to the existing road frontage with Liverton Road.

The Southern Gully covers an area of approximately 4 ha and is located on the floor of an open section of the catchment which runs from north to south. After passing through the wetland area, the unnamed stream flows through a steeper gorge-like section before falling down a series of waterfalls, after which it joins Te Awa Kairangi. The Southern Gully is likely present due to a range of seepages from the surrounding hills, as well as the waterfalls downstream acting as a natural barrier that impedes flows and backs up groundwater within the wetland area.

The Southern Gully area is zoned Rural under both the Operative and Proposed District

Plans.

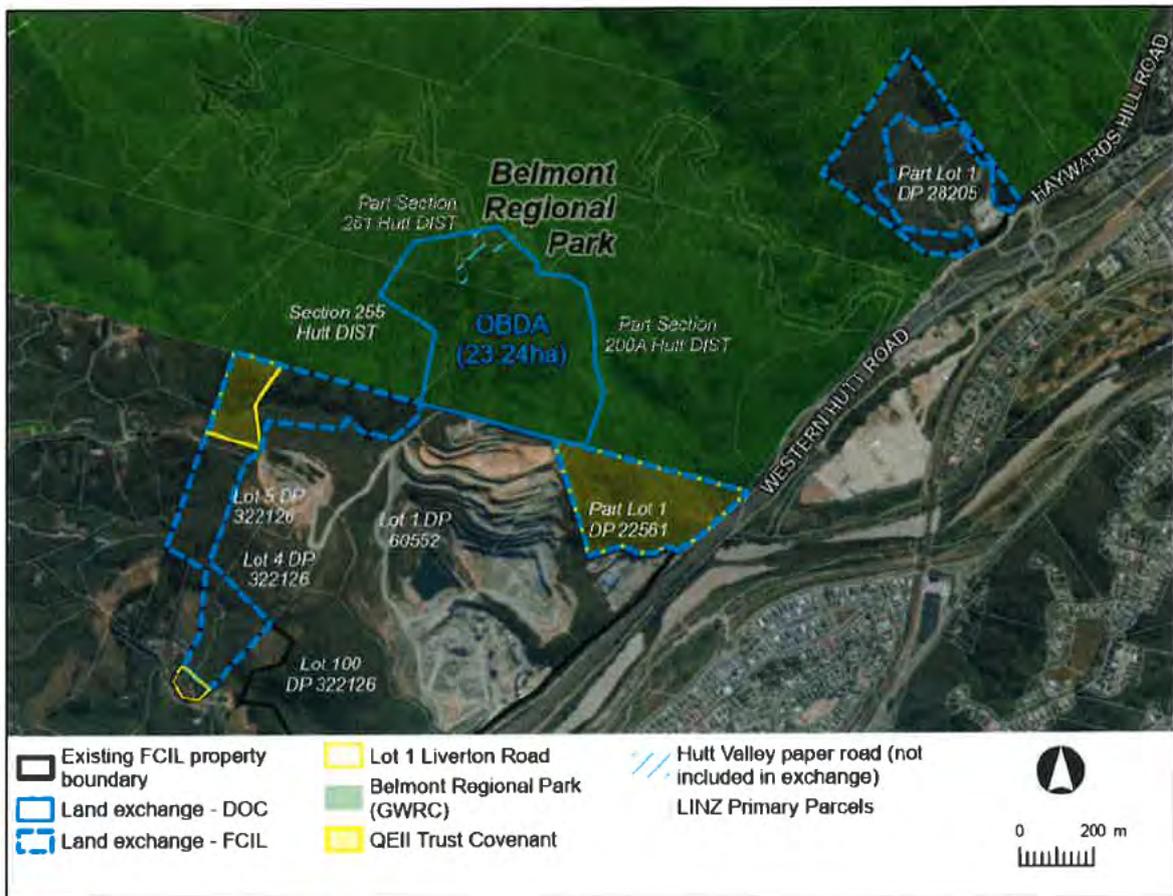


Figure 2: Map of land exchange parcels

# Belmont Quarry

- Belmont Quarry supplies approximately **40% of Wellington's aggregate needs** and over 50% of high-grade materials for concrete and roading.
- Wellington region uses **8–10 tonnes of aggregate per person annually**; an average house requires around 250 tonnes
- Belmont and Horokiwi are the two main quarries supplying the region; Willowbank is further away and not yet operational.
- Belmont's proximity (22 km from Wellington CBD) is critical for **cost-effective supply and emissions reduction**.
- Local supply is essential to keep **construction affordable and reduce transport-related emissions**.
  - Aggregate for Transmission Gully was sourced from as far as **Mt Taranaki (300 km)**, increasing costs and emissions.
- Belmont quarry is nearing capacity for overburden disposal; **less than two years of current capacity remain**.

# Belmont Quarry Expansion

## **Proposal**

Identify a win-win-win solution for the environment, the community and the quarry through the transfer of land with higher ecological value into the Belmont Regional Park, in exchange for a smaller area of lower value park land.

The goal of the swap is to enhance the overall environment and increase recreational opportunities for the community.

The land we receive will become a new Overburden Disposal Area (OBDA) and will extend the quarry's life by 40 years.

## **What is overburden?**

Overburden is the material overlying the greywacke resource and comprises topsoil, clay, greensand, limestone and highly weathered greywacke and contains less than 1% of vegetation.

Due to the physical and chemical characteristics of overburden, it is generally not suitable for any large scale commercial use such as engineered fill.

The demand is low for this material and only very small volumes of this material is used off-site for bulk fill from Belmont Quarry.

Dear

I'm writing on behalf of the Friends of Belmont Regional Park (FoBRP), about the proposed land-swap with Winstone Aggregates (WA). As you'll be aware, the land that WA want to acquire is public land, part of a Key Native Ecosystem, owned by DoC, and managed by GWRC. WA have claimed that the park land is of low ecological value, but that is clearly not the case.

DoC are currently considering whether to accept or decline WA's proposed land-swap, and GWRC will be asked to comment to DoC on that. The FoBRP have been working hard over the last year to better define the ecology of the park land in question, and have discovered some important species that the WA's own eco-surveys appear to have missed entirely.

We (FoBRP) want to ensure that GW is aware of all these findings, and our concerns about the land-swap, to better inform their comments to DoC.

Initially, I'll present the main points here, but we would be glad to call in and talk to the key people in person at any time. We're also greatly aware of the urgency of all of this, and would be happy to take any GW or DoC staff in to see the area for themselves. The botanical findings seem to be increasing by the week, and are all visible on iNaturalist, eg via this link (with a couple of screen-grabs attached to this Email) :

In summary :

- Currently 16 observations of Swamp Maire (Threatened - Nationally Vulnerable)
- 20 observations of Ramarama (Threatened - Nationally Critical)
- these populations are well protected here. Nationally they are both at risk from Myrtle rust.
- WA have recently reduced the area they wish to use, to avoid the first of these Swamp Maire populations, but may not be aware of the rest
- To protect these swamp-loving plants also requires careful conservation of their upstream water catchments.
- We have also found Coprosma rubra (At Risk – Declining)
- **Overall, the area in question has a rich diversity of plant life, with 98 species noted so far**
- **In particular, the shallow valley trending SSE towards the large pond is a particularly rich and valuable habitat**
- Potentially, that area could become the perfect focus for a new walkway, which would significantly enhance community connection.
  
- The DoC/GWRC land in question is not just regenerating farmland; it is part of a KNE which contains original landforms, wetlands and streams, and incised gullies with original native forest. This land is protected by a well-maintained network of bait-lines.
- The proposed land-swap would destroy the original landforms and fragment the structure of this part of the regional park
- Two parcels of the WA land proposed for the swap are already protected by a QEII covenant
- The QEII protection was a resource consent requirement for a previous quarry expansion. It has already been traded for other land.
- **The proposed land-swap does not offer any net ecological gain, but instead a significant ecological loss.**
- Should the land-swap and fast-track proposal go ahead, the FoBRP would be extremely concerned about the financial burden that would be placed on public funds for remediation, should WA, their parent company, or a later new owner, fail. A significant bond would need to be set aside to counter that possibility, but we have seen no mention of that in the WA proposals.
  
- **The recreational value of Belmont Regional Park would be significantly reduced by the land-swap**

- Access to the QEII-covenanted WA land would be impossible, given that the access from the north would be blocked by WA earthworks, and access from the south is too steep to access (the GW contractors even find it challenging).
- WA have recently stated that "*We see genuine ecological and community value in this land becoming part of the Belmont Regional Park, creating more space for everyone to explore, connect with nature, and enjoy for generations to come.*". But that could not work if the area is inaccessible.

Thank you for considering this and bringing it to the attention of those in GWRC who will be commenting to DoC. We look forward to your response and repeat our offer to help GWRC in anyway we can.

I just wanted to quickly get in touch to let you know we are in the process of finalising some changes to our land swap application for DOC. Our original proposal, which we talked you through, was to exchange 31 hectares of Winstone land for 29 hectares of land in Belmont Regional Park.

We took onboard some of your feedback around the ecology of the area and plan to exclude parts that host the swamp maire you identified and a bit of wetland. We are also going to carve out a piece of Dry Creek, which is considered to have low ecological value, from the land exchange package. That means we are currently looking at exchanging 29 hectares of our land for 24 hectares land in Belmont Regional Park.

We are getting those boundaries redrawn right now and will share an updated map with

you by the end of the week. We're also in the process of finalising the ecology and economic assessments, so we expect to be able to share information from those in the coming weeks.

I am reaching out to provide you with more information about the quarry development in the Belmont Regional Park. The proposed expansion of the Belmont Quarry is listed under Schedule 2 of the Fast-Track Approvals Act (FTA Act) as a project requiring a land exchange for a substantive application.

## **Background**

The Belmont Quarry serves a key part of the Wellington regions' supply chain and has supported essential infrastructure and transport projects such as the Transmission Gully, the Northern Corridor and Riverlink. Its aggregates is vital for the region's growth and resilience, making it indispensable to Wellington's development.

Today the quarry continues to play a vital role by supplying around 40% of Wellington's total aggregates needs and over half of the high-quality material used in concrete for housing and road construction.

Winstone Aggregates is developing the proposal to ensure a continued, sustainable supply of aggregates for the Wellington region for years to come.

## **Summary of Proposal**

The project seeks to establish a new overburden area within Belmont Regional Park, immediately adjacent to the existing quarry, (as shown on the Stakeholder update attached). This will be facilitated through a land exchange involving approximately 24 hectares of regional park land currently owned by the Department of Conservation (DoC) with up to 30 hectares of land owned by Fletcher Concrete and Infrastructure Limited (FCIL) the parent company of Winstone Aggregates. The exchange includes land protected under the Queen Elizabeth II (QEII) National Trust currently owned by FCIL and transferred to DoC as part of this exchange.

The land exchanged from DoC will be used for the future placement of overburden material, which is the natural material above the rock resource, that needs to be moved to gain access to the rock below. This proposed work is located more than 2 km northeast of the Kelson Community Centre.

I have attached a copy of our Stakeholder Update for September 2025.

### **Background**

The Belmont Quarry serves a key part of the Wellington regions' supply chain and has supported essential infrastructure and transport projects such as the Transmission Gully, the Northern Corridor and Riverlink. Its aggregates is vital for the region's growth and resilience, making it indispensable to Wellington's development.

Today the quarry continues to play a vital role by supplying around 40% of Wellington's total aggregates needs and over half of the high-quality material used in concrete for housing and road construction.

Thank you for your request for a written comments from NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi (NZTA) in regard to the proposed preliminary steps for a land exchange under Sections 32-36 of the Fast-track Approvals Act 2024 (FTAA). NZTA is an adjacent landowner, designation holder and has interests in the land to be exchanged by the Crown. We provide our written comments as follows:

**Proposal**

The proposed expansion of the Belmont Quarry is listed under Schedule 2 of the FTAA. The project seeks to establish a new overburden area within Belmont Regional Park, immediately adjacent to the existing quarry.

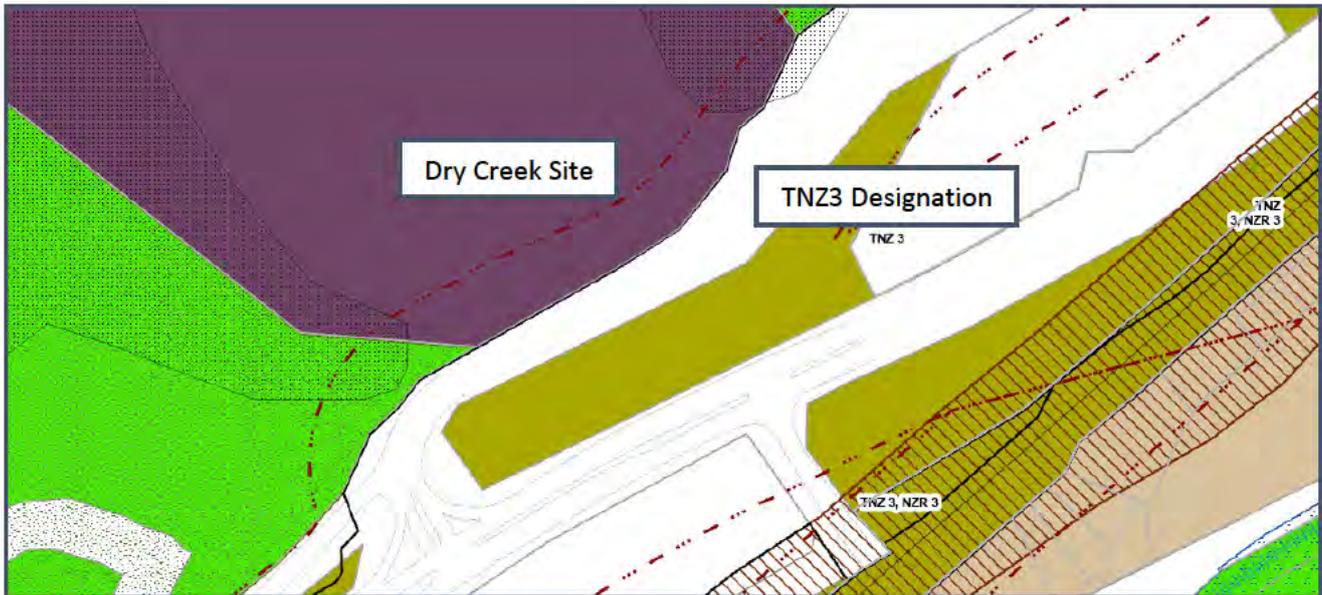
This will be facilitated through a land exchange involving approximately 24 hectares of regional park land currently owned by the Department of Conservation (DoC), and up to 30 hectares of land owned by Fletcher Concrete and Infrastructure Limited (FCIL), the parent company of Winstone Aggregates. The exchange includes land protected under the Queen Elizabeth II (QEII) National Trust currently owned by FCIL.

**NZTA Interests as an Adjacent Landowner and Designation Holder**

NZTA is the road controlling authority of both State Highway 2 and State Highway 58 located in immediate proximity to the subject sites and has two designations that front two of the parcels of land subject to the exchange as follows:

**Dry Creek**

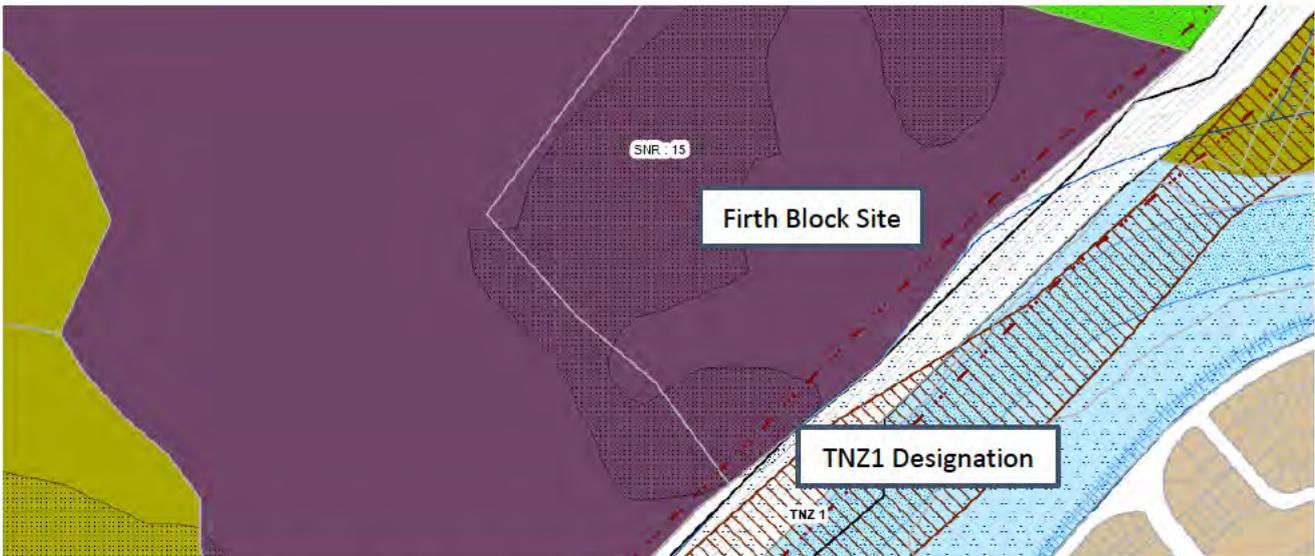

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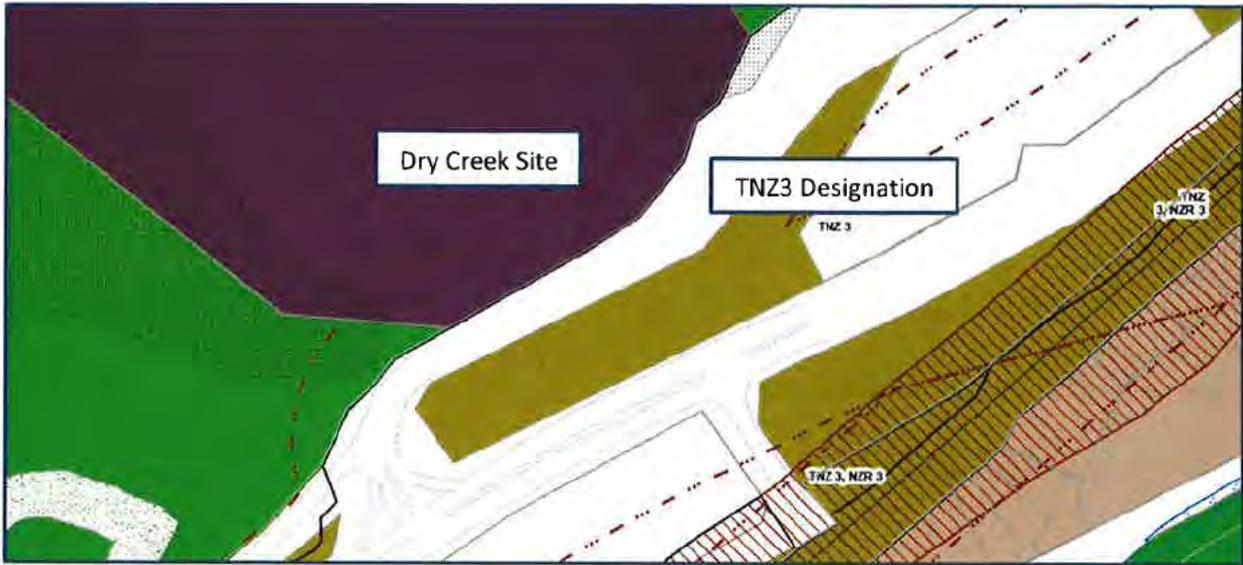


Figure 1: HCC District Plan Extract Showing Extend of NZTA TNZ3 Boundary in Proximity to the Dry Creek Site

NZTA is an adjacent landowner of the 'Dry Creek' area of land subject to the land exchange, located at 2 Haywards Hill Road, Haywards. NZTA administers the portion of Hebden Crescent that immediately fronts the site, with Designation TNZ3 extending over this section of Hebden Crescent shown in Figure 1 below.

**Firth Block**

NZTA is a designation holder adjacent to the 'Firth Block' area of land subject to the land exchange located within the Belmont Quarry at 541 Hebden Crescent, Kelson. NZTA administers the TNZ1 Designation as shown in Figure 2 below.

Winstone Aggregates have stated that as a result of the land exchange there is no anticipated change in land use on both the Dry Creek and Firth Block sites, nor an increase in traffic effects. NZTA has considered the proposal as a landowner and designation holder and considers that as a result of the land exchange, there will not be impacts on NZTA administered land, nor will the exchange and associated use prevent or hinder the NZTA's ability to give effect to its designation.

**NZTA Interests in the Subject Conservation Land:**

NZTA has an informal interest in the area of land that is subject to the proposed land exchange. As part of the State Highway 58 Safety Improvements Project (SH58), NZTA has designation conditions which requires planting to be undertaken within the Belmont Regional Park to offset the removal of indigenous vegetation along the SH58 alignment.

NZTA had proposed to undertake this offset planting within the area of conservation land subject to this land exchange (shown in Green in Attachment 1). This land had been previously identified by GWRC as a suitable location where pest plant species could be removed, and new indigenous vegetation planting undertaken, to provide a positive offset for the removal of vegetation associated with facilitating the SH58 Safety Improvements.

NZTA had previously obtained approval in principle from DoC and the Greater Wellington Regional Council (GWRC) to undertake offset planting within the land exchange subject area and had completed ecological investigation on this parcel of land. NZTA has an approved Ecological Management Plan certified by both the Hutt City Council (HCC) and Upper Hutt City Council (UHCC) for the planting to be undertaken within this location.

### **Consultation**

NZTA recently became aware of the proposal by Winstone Aggregates to exchange the land subject to our offset planting, through both NZTA and Winstone Aggregates consultation with GWRC in September 2025. NZTA has been corresponding with Winstone Aggregates on how both organisations can best progress this mutual interest in this land.

Following recent engagement with Winstone Aggregates, NZTA has been investigating alternative options to undertake offset planting in other locations within the Belmont Regional Park. NZTA acknowledges the assistance of GWRC in identifying new suitable alternative areas within the Belmont Regional Park.

### **Resolution on NZ Transport Agency Interests:**

NZTA is currently investigating alternatives to relocate the offset planting within other areas of the Belmont Regional Park and has been in discussions with the GWRC, HCC and UHCC to do so. GWRC has proposed a new site outside of the land exchange area which has been agreed to in principle by NZTA. NZTA is now seeking internal sign off, and approval from HCC and UHCC, that this alternative location complies with our offset planting requirements. NZTA can confirm that our only interest in the land exchange is the proposed offset area, and as described above, is actively working to secure a new location outside of the land subject to the land exchange, to fulfil our obligation for completing the offset planting. When NZTA obtains the relevant approvals, we will have no further interest in the land exchange.

Please note that this letter does not constitute NZ Transport Agency Waka Kotahi comments in regard to the substantive FTAA. NZTA will provide comments on this application if invited to do so by the expert panel, in due course.

I'm writing on behalf of Winstone Aggregates to provide you with an update on our Fast Track approval application for the development of the Belmont Quarry.

**Summary of the Proposal**

The proposed expansion of the Belmont Quarry is listed under Schedule 2 of the Fast-Track Approvals Act (FTA Act) as a project requiring a land exchange for a substantive application.

The project seeks to establish a new overburden area within Belmont Regional Park, immediately adjacent to the existing quarry. This will be facilitated through a land exchange involving approximately 24 hectares of regional park land currently owned by the Department of Conservation (DoC), and up to 30 hectares of land owned by Fletcher Concrete and Infrastructure Limited (FCIL), the parent company of Winstone Aggregates. The exchange includes land protected under the Queen Elizabeth II (QEII) National Trust currently owned by FCIL.

Enclosed with this letter is a layout showing the proposed overburden area and the land exchange components.

**Adjoining Property**

We are contacting you specifically because the Firth Block QEII land exchange boundary adjoins New Zealand Transport controlled road, being the Western Hutt Highway (State Highway 2, see Appendix 1a) and the Dry Creek exchange boundary adjoins Hebden Crescent which extends over State Highway 2, see Appendix 1b and 1c).

As part of the exchange, the area immediately adjoining this property will be transferred to DoC. We are also investigating options to support ecological connectivity and to improve the natural character of the exchanged land. Once the land is formally transferred to DoC, they will determine its future use and management, in line with conservation objectives.

**Traffic Effects**

As part of the land exchange and proposed quarry development, no new accessway onto the state highway will be created. There will be no change in traffic movements entering or leaving the site, as all vehicle movements will be internalised within the site between the new overburden area and the quarry extraction area.

**Next Steps**

At this stage we are seeking to lodge the land exchange application by the end of September followed by the substantive application by the end of the year.

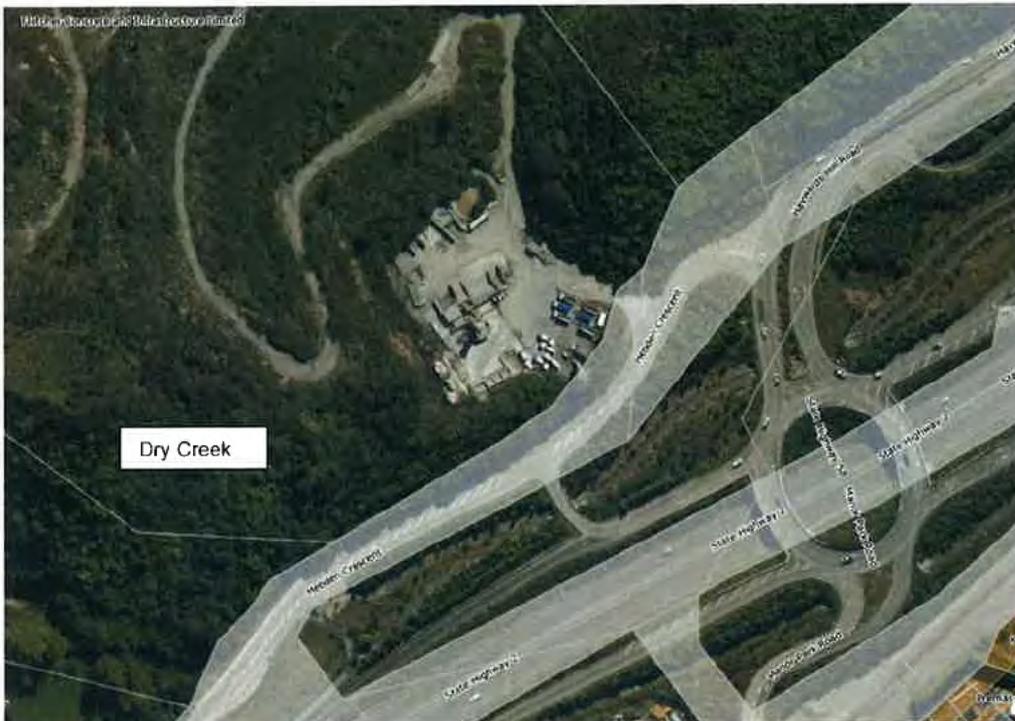

## BACKGROUND

Belmont Quarry has been building the foundations of Wellington for over 100 years, serving a key part of regions supply chain.

The quarry has supported essential infrastructure and transport projects such as Transmission Gully, the Northern Corridor and now RiverLink. Its aggregate is vital for the region's growth and resilience, making it indispensable to Wellington's development.

Today, it continues to play a vital role by supplying around 40% of Wellington's total aggregate needs and over half of the high-quality materials used in concrete for housing and road construction.



Belmont's location close to Upper Hutt, Hutt City and Wellington City is crucial as transport costs are a major factor in the price of aggregate. Sourcing materials locally helps keep construction affordable for homes, schools, roads and public spaces in our communities. It also reduces emissions from long-distance transport, supporting our shared goals for a more sustainable future.

Under current consents, the remaining overburden capacity at Belmont is limited. Overburden is the natural material above the rock resource, and to access that rock it needs to be moved. There is currently no commercial market for overburden despite offers to repurpose it. Transporting it off site is cost prohibitive and could make quarry operations uneconomic. Planning for additional capacity is therefore critical to ensuring a continued, sustainable supply of aggregate for the Wellington region for years to come.

# THE PROPOSAL

In 2024 we submitted an application for the Belmont Quarry development to be considered eligible for inclusion under the Fast Track Approvals Act. This was successful and we are now working toward filing the substantive application early 2026.

Our original proposal identified a small portion of Belmont Regional Park suitable to be used for overburden placement. The Regional Park spans 3,500 hectares and is owned by the Department of Conservation (DOC) and managed by Greater Wellington Regional Council. By accessing this land, we will be able to extend the quarry's life by 40 years and secure a long-term, local supply of aggregate within the region.

In exchange, we propose to transfer some of the land owned by our parent company Fletcher Concrete and Infrastructure Limited (FCIL) bordering the Park to DOC.

## ENGAGEMENT

We are working closely with a range of local people and organisations on the proposed land exchange to ensure we achieve positive environmental and community outcomes.

As a result of the feedback we received from these initial engagements, and in consultation with our ecologist, we have made some adjustments to our proposed land exchange.

## CURRENT PROPSAL

We have made several changes to the original plan. These include:

- Adjusting the boundaries of the land exchanged with Belmont Regional Park to avoid some specific areas where native vegetation (particularly swamp maire) and wetland is present
- A section of Dry Creek with lower ecological value has been excluded from the package, ensuring that only areas of higher ecological value is offered back
- Offering additional high-quality land to become part of the Belmont Regional Park and be accessible for the public.

These changes mean the land areas (in hectares) we are proposing be exchanged is approximately:

The Northern Gully, Southern Gully, Firth Block and parts of Dry Creek are important not only for their ecological values and ecosystem connectivity, but also for community connection to nature.

We see genuine ecological and community value in this land becoming part of the Belmont Regional Park, creating more space for everyone to explore, connect with nature, and enjoy for generations to come.

## LAND EXCHANGE PACKAGE

Winstone is committed to ensuring we enhance the overall conservation values of the area under the land exchange.

Our goal is to deliver a package that creates a net-positive outcome for both the environment and the community that supports Wellington's long-term need for infrastructure, while also enhancing the local ecosystems, supporting restoration planting and improving public access.

We are currently finalising these details and intend to submit the package to DOC by the end of November.

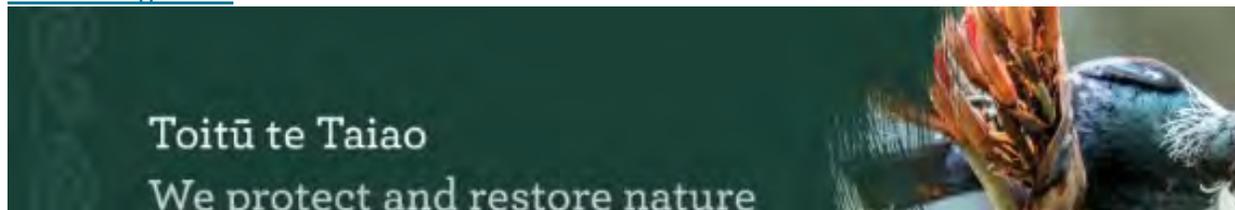

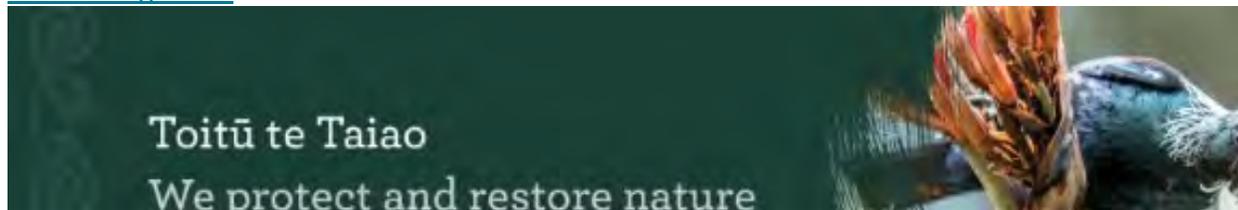

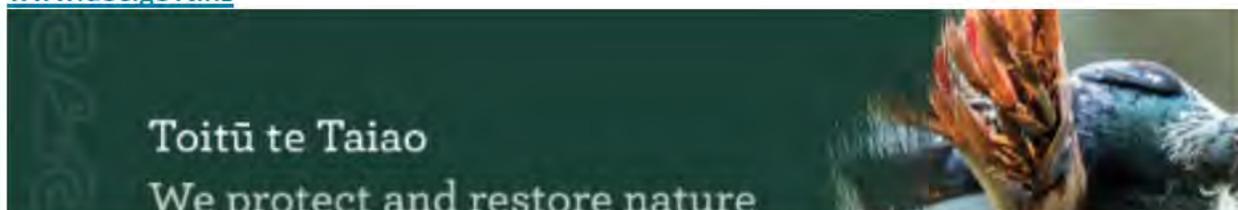

This approach reflects the Board’s commitment to shared leadership, partnership values, and equitable workload distribution, particularly given the busy schedules of Board members. It also supports continuity and smooth transitions when one Co-Chair’s term concludes.

To facilitate the appointment process, [redacted] [redacted] was appointed as independent interim Chair for the duration of the vote.

██████ moved that ██████ and ██████ continue in their roles as Co-Chairs. The motion was carried by a majority vote.

Concerns were raised regarding the constitutional basis for the Co-Chair model. ██████ clarified that while the Conservation Board Manual does not explicitly provide for Co-Chairs, the model has been adopted by many Boards across the country and is now considered common practice.

The Board agreed **to review the Co-Chair model in February 2026** to ensure it continues to meet governance needs and aligns with best practice.

**Contextual Note:**

The Wellington Conservation Board formally adopted the Co-Chair model at its meeting on **27 May 2022**, replacing the Deputy Chair format. This decision was recorded in the confirmed minutes of that meeting, with support expressed for a Treaty Co-Chair arrangement. While this was not discussed during the current meeting, it provides relevant background to the Board's ongoing use of the Co-Chair model.

**Note on Governance:**

Section 12.2 of the Conservation Board Manual requires that one member be elected as Chair under the Conservation Act. While the Co-Chair model is not formally recognised in legislation, Boards may adopt it informally provided it does not conflict with statutory requirements.

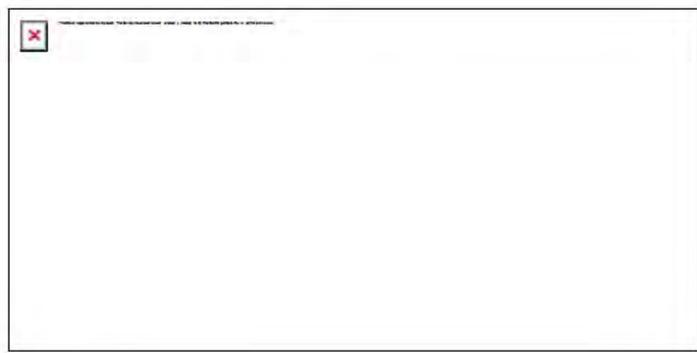

You will note, on page 52, our ecologist records that in all the water systems present within the exchange, there is considerable fish passage challenge from the Hutt River. The fish surveys confirm there are no trout or trout hatchery or fishery in any stream within the footprint of our Land Exchange and proposed overburden area.

Additionally, within the proposed overburden disposal area (OBDA) area, the gullies have the wrong substrate and little water within them. There is also no trout adult or juvenile access from the Hutt River to the gullies present on the side of the OBDA.

Once you've reviewed the report, please do let me know the position of Fish & Game and if you'd like to discuss anything in detail. We aim to lodge the land exchange application by the end of this month.
